Our first Work Party will be Saturday, 7th. Kathy's Galley will be open as usual so everyone can start their day with a hearty breakfast.



HISTORIAN NOTES KATHIE HAMMER



If you have visited San Francisco's Maritime National Historical Park at Hyde Street you probably visited the CA Thayer. The CA Thayer is one of only a few schooners still in

existence.

A hundred years ago there were hundreds of schooners that sailed the We st Coast hauling lumber. The schooner was built in 1895 by Hans Ditlev Bendixsen, a Denmark native, in Fairhaven, across the Humboldt Bay from Eureka. The ship was named after Clarence A. Thayer, a partner in a San Francisco Lumber Company.

The CA Thayer retired from hauling lumber in 1912. From 1912 to 1924 she took small fishing boats, barrel staves and salt to Alaska in the spring, then came back with salted salmon in the summer. From 1925 to 1930 she made cod fishing trips from Washington to the Bering Strait. After the Depression she was sold to the Army which used her as an Ammunition ship after they removed her masts. The CA Thayer made her last voyage in 1950. She is in the history books as the last commercial sailing vessel.

The CA Thayer was towed recently to the Oakland Estuary to begin a two year, \$9.6 million overhaul. She will be rebuilt to historical accuracy.

7. Family Membership: a. Shall consist of a husband and wife, who shall enjoy all rights and/or privileges of the Club.

- b. Shall have one undivided vote per membership, exercised by either member.
- c. A Regular Member wishing to transfer to Family Membership shall apply to the Board of Directors, for approval, and pay the difference between the initiation fee for Regular and Family Membership plus appropriate additional dues.
- d. Applicants wishing to join the Club as Family Membership shall apply for Associate Membership according to Article III 4-a.
- e. Only one member of a Family Membership shall be eligible to hold an elective office at the same time.
- f. Upon the death of a Family Member, the surviving spouse shall be transferred to Regular

Membership retaining any co-held facilities. Should the surviving spouse be the wife, in keeping with tradition, she shall have the option to become an Honorary Member, and must exercise the option within 180 days.

- g. Should divorce occur, the Family Membership will convert to two Regular Memberships, subject to separate dues. The question of cabin or berth occupancy, if any, would be a matter of negotiation between those members and the Board of Directors.
- 8. Life Membership:

A Regular or Family Member of the Club after thirty (30) years of continuous membership in the Club and having reached the age of sixty-two (62) shall be awarded a Life Membership in the Club. The member shall enjoy all the rights and/or privileges of the Club, and conform to all rules and regulations, and will be exempt from paying membership dues.

9. Honorary Membership: In keeping with tradition, Honorary Membership shall be awarded to widows of Club members, and to persons the Club wishes to so honor or to so designate as a result of unusual service or contribution to the Club. These memberships shall be for life or until terminated by the Board of Directors. A vote to affirm or overrule the Board's decision is required at the next General Membership meeting.

10. Resignation:

A member may resign at any time by written notice to the Club Secretary. There shall be no refund of initiation fee, dues or any other fees paid in advance, except by action of the Board.

11. Maximum Memberships: The maximum number of dues paying memberships shall be determined from time to time by the Board and approved by the General Membership.





2004 Sportsmen Yacht Club Annual Fishing Derby Rules

- 1. Entry fee(s) must be paid to Neal or Diane Essary at least 24 HOURS PRIOR TO WEIGHING IN ANY FISH.
- 2. The entry fee is \$5.00 per category (Striped Bass, Sturgeon, or Catfish). The fee for all three (3) categories is \$15.00.
- 3. If no fish are entered for a category, 1st, 2nd, 3rd, and 4th places will be awarded to entrants in that category and will be determined by a drawing.
- 4. The entry fee will cover a member, their spouse, their children to age 18, and their grandchildren to age 18.
- 5. This derby is open to our Regular, Family, Associate, Lifetime, and Honorary members.
- 6. Any Associate member turned down for membership will have their entry fee refunded.
- 7. One person may win all four (4) places and all three (3) categories.
- 8. All participants must adhere to all California Sport Fishing Regulations to qualify for prizes.
- 9. To be fair and equal to all participants, the fish being entered must be weighed in at the Sportsmen Yacht Club scales and witnessed by a Sportsmen member or by our Club Caretaker. The results must be posted and initialed on the appropriate weight-in sheet.
- 10. Prizes:1st Place50% of money received in that category2nd Place30% of money received in that category3rd Place20% of money received in that category4th PlacePrepaid entry fee in that category for the 2005 Derby
- 11. This derby begins January 1, 2004, and ends December 31, 2004, at midnight.
- 12. All prize money will be awarded at our Regular Membership Meeting on January 7, 2005.
