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

Did you know there was a "Caruso of the ferries"? He was a young deckhand with an operatic voice on the Southern Pacific ferries who delighted the passengers with selections from the favorite scores while helping with the mooring lines when the boat docked.

There was also a man with one arm and was deaf that carried envelopes of lavender. On each envelope there was an explanation that this was his only means of support. When the ferry got under way, he would go into top deck saloon and drop an envelope into each persons lap, then he doubled back after the passengers had time to read the message and either collect money offered or the packet itself, if the passenger didn't want to purchase it. Then he would repeat this on the other side of the saloon and then both sides of the main deck.

The record of the ferries is impressive, in the height of Bay travel, over 50 ferries on various routes, sometimes all traveling at the same time, each carefully missing each other. Most near collisions were fortunately avoided by skillful navigation, making the ferries a popular mode of travel.

OFFICIAL START OF SAN FRANCISCO'S 2011 BOATING SEASON

WHEN: Sunday May 1, 2011, Crissy Field to Pier 39, starting at 12 Noon.

WHAT: The 94th Annual "Opening Day on the Bay" Decorated Boat Parade, hosted by the Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association (PICYA), representing over 100 yacht clubs in Northern California celebrates the official beginning of the 2011 boating season on San Francisco Bay.

This year's theme is "Giants of the Bay" celebrating the many people and things that have made San Francisco

so unique. "Emperor Norton IV" is the Grand Marshal.

The parade will feature over 120 historic workboats, fireboats, towboats, classic and contemporary craft decorated to the theme. There will be both power and sail boats competing for best decoration honors. There are six trophies up for grabs and prize bags for

the participants with great items such as dining certificates, event tickets, wine, clothing, art work, boat gear, books, travel, and sailing excursions all donated by various businesses and yacht clubs.

These boats can be viewed by the public along the San Francisco waterfront from Crissy Field, which is west of the Marina Green to Pier 39, 12 noon until 3 p.m. The occasion will be a unique opportunity to see these special boats, sailing close to shore where land-based spectators can enjoy the event. This is an event for the whole family to enjoy, learn about boating and to get excited for the America's Cup #34 to be held in San Francisco in 2013.

WHERE: Free public viewing is available on San Francisco's Northern Shoreline from Crissy Field to Pier 39.

Those seeking a closer view of the decorated boats can join the Officers, Directors and guests of PICYA on the "California Hornblower," one of the Hornblower's largest yachts on San Francisco Bay, with a light breakfast

and a gourmet lunch. This event is open to the public.

HOW: A press boat is available for members of the media interested in covering the parade on the water; this boat will be on the water moving throughout the parade route, providing excellent photo opportunities.

WHO: Organized by the Pacific Inter-Club Yacht Association (PICYA), which was formed in San Francisco in 1896 to improve communications yacht clubs, provide uniform racing rules, and encourage yachting. Today PICYA is the only organization in Northern California that supports the promotion of recreational boating through the coordination and dissemination of information for the benefit of boaters. It publishes the Yachting Yearbook, the annual directory of member clubs and information, and created Recreational Boaters of California, a governmental



advocacy organization committed to promoting the enjoyment, protections, and responsible use of our waterways. See www.RBOC.org. PICYA has coordinated Opening Day since 1917.

Looking forward to seeing everyone at the Club or on the water...



You can have a list of tasks that may cover the whole house. You probably would want to clean the windows all at once for the whole house. You may want to shampoo your carpets on the same day. If cleaning the carpets or windows are too big to complete in one day. Divide the projects up into sections over several days. If you can get the whole family to help out you can usually get the job done much faster than if you do the cleaning all by yourself.

Switch out the furnace filters which you should try to do on a regular basis. It is also a good time to go around changing out smoke alarm batteries.

If you have wood furniture it might be a good time to polish them with a wax or other polish sprays. This can protect the finish on them from getting worn out and old looking. The extra coating can protect against spills and scratches.

Dust everything that you can. Hopefully you have been dusting as you go throughout the year. You might not dust the ceiling fan very often. So this is a good time to dust those spots you don't usually get to dust. You should also clean out behind the refrigerator and vacuum the dust that may have built up around the motor. Also you should clean out the lint that may have collected in your dryer and in the dryer vents.

If you have vinyl flooring you might want to mop and wax the floor to give it a shine. If you have a tile flooring you might want to scrub the grout extra good and reseal the grout to keep the floors clean looking. There are special grout sealers at home improvement stores. The same grout cleaning can be done for tiles in the shower and the countertons.

Sofas should be cleaned. If there are stains that you can spot scrub this could save a big huge cleaning do that. If not you might have to take the cushions and clean them, then clean the remainder with a upholstery cleaning solution. This can take time so you almost want to plan it for a day by itself.

Clutter can be one of the biggest problems many people face in their living spaces. Get yourself down to less stuff so that you can enjoy the space you live in. If you have too much stuff it can become difficult to keep a tidy house. If you don't use the stuff, you can sell it in a garage sale, or you can donate to Goodwill. The less stuff, the easy it can be to clean your home on a regular basis. If you must have stuff, consider purchasing storage solutions to hide your stuff. That way you can have your stuff but it won't take over your home. Plus you will be able to find it and put it back, because it will have a place for it.

As you can see there is just so much to do, that it is probably unreasonable to get all these things completed in one day. In order to keep your sanity, you and your family should schedule these projects over the next several weeks so that you can get your home all spruced up again after a long winter.
