

Greetings!

New to our club this year is the inclusion of a Finance Committee. With the size and budget of our Club, the Board members thought it would be important to have a group specifically designed to review our Club finances. The committee members currently include Diane Essary, Marina Faconti, Alice Jackman, Darlene Moore and myself. The committee meets approximately once a month, and is open for any and all who would like to attend and add their input.

Thus far the committee has met twice and has discussed several financial topics including overall Club income and expense, utilities and other monthly expenses, Club events and their associated costs, etc. The Finance Committee is solely an advisory committee, and any recommendations resulting will be presented to the Board and/or membership.

One of the first findings of the committee was that our energy bill has increased dramatically over the last 4 years, to the tune of a 27% increase from 2011 to 2014!! While some of this additional cost was due to rate increases, the rest was likely due to usage we can help control, such as heating and air conditioning. It has been asked of our membership that we make sure that the AC and heater are used efficiently and that doors and windows are closed during their use. Some small efforts in keeping our costs lower will benefit us all.

As Sportsmen, we find there are many ideas provided and expectations of fellow Club members. We welcome constructive ideas regarding better management of Club costs; please feel free to approach any member of the finance committee with any ideas or suggestions. The committee was formed to serve and improve the financial monitoring of our Club finances.

Thanks to the book, "King and Queen of the River," by Stan Garvey that was loaned to me by Neal and Diane Essary, I believe I have some interesting history of the Delta for you.

Before the California Gold Rush, the Sacramento River flowed clear and pristine from its headwaters near Mount Shasta down the Sacramento Valley and into the San Francisco Bay. Known only to the American Indians and a few trappers and exploring mariners, the river teemed with fish and wildlife.

Captain C.A.M. Taber, sailing his vessel from the Bay to Sacramento in 1848, described what he saw:


"The sloughs of the main stream were alive with several species of wild ducks and the wooded banks of the river, as well as the tules (large bushes), were home for large bands of deer and elk. Grizzly Bears were often seen foraging for acorns in the oak groves near the river".

Three decades later John Muir remarked that "the forests along the river reminded him of tropical jungles." For many years, the Sacramento retained much of its primitive beauty. By the turn of the century, however, most of the marshland along the river had become farmland protected by levees, yet the Sacramento still had a Huck Finn quality about it. Along its banks stood great cottonwoods, willows, oaks, and sycamores, wild grape and blackberry vines hung on the water's edge.

The following is from PICYA's link from the National Boating Federation eBulletin:

ALEXANDRIA, VA, March 17, 2015—As boaters are about to begin the spring ritual of getting their boats ready for the season, Boat Owners Association of The United States (BoatUS) is advising they will need to pay extra attention to the fire extinguishers aboard. A well-known fire extinguisher manufacturer, Kidde, in conjunction with the US Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC), has announced a voluntary recall to replace certain Kidde fire extinguisher units. A faulty

valve component can cause the disposable fire extinguishers not to fully discharge when the lever is repeatedly pressed and released during a fire emergency, posing a risk of injury. About 4.6 million extinguishers are affected that were sold nationwide between August 2013 and November 2014.
